







Forms of participation

- Petitions, referendum
- citizens' or neighbourhood budgets
- round tables, planning workshops, neighbourhood committees, citizens' committees, citizens' forums
- Citizens' reports, neighbourhood pacts, arbitration and moderation procedures
- district or neighbourhood management

	Advantages to citizen participants	Advantages to initiators
Decision process	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Education • Persuade decision-makers • Gain skills for active / democratic citizenship • Self-efficacy experiences 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Education • Persuade citizens • Build strategic alliances • Gain legitimacy of and acceptance towards decisions
Outcomes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Trust in political procedures • Better policy and implementation decision 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Break gridlock; achieve outcomes • Better policy and implementation decisions • Citizen compliance • Social capital

Disadvantages of citizen participation


	Disadvantages to citizen participants	Disadvantages to initiators
Decision process	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Time consuming (even dull) • Pointless if decision is ignored • Loss of trust in political procedures • Disenchantment with politics 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Time-consuming • Costly • May ‘backfire’ and create hostility towards (policy) change • Disenchantment with politics
Outcomes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Worse policy decision if heavily influenced by opposing interest groups or ‘loud minorities’ 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Loss of decision-making control • Possibility of a bad decision that is hard to ignore • Less budget for implementation • Less compliance








